Join forums and online communities for loads of useful tips and tricks, help and guidance from other motorhome lovers. Sharing experiences is a great way to learn.


Pre-travel checks

- Secure all cupboards and drawers and lock the tables
- Turn the gas bottles off when driving
- Pack away any ramps
- Close and secure all doors and windows


Get to know your motorhome

Learn about the dimensions and weights of your motorhome to avoid any unnecessary accidents. Take your fully stocked and ready to go motorhome to a weighbridge and check its weight with all passengers on board to make sure it doesn't exceed the maximum weight allowed. And don't forget to check your tyres pressure before setting off.




Invest in technology

Spending some money in technology such as parking sensors or tracking devices can really pay off and gives you extra peace of mind.



Ride your bike

Take your bikes with you (or rent some) – this will allow you and your family to explore the surroundings without having to drive your motorhome all the time. It can comfortably sit in a campsite for a few days.



Follow the rules while driving

If you're new to motorhoming, don't rush – take your time to get comfortable driving this type of vehicle. Make sure everyone is wearing their seatbelts, adjust your mirrors properly and always stick to the speed limits. And, of course, make sure you're licensed to drive a motorhome.

Use the facilities

Use the washing up and showering campsite facilities as much as possible to save you time, money and resources; if you can't, or choose not to, double up your water carrier so you don't run out of water half way through a shower. Remember to drain your water system before you leave.

Stay safe

Keep your motorhome locked, windows closed and valuables out of sight when you're not around, even if it's just for a short period of time to avoid theft.

When travelling

- Never leave the keys in the ignition or unattended when you're not in the driver's seat.
- Don't leave valuables in plain sight, especially when you go out.
- Go for extra locks on doors and windows to add an extra layer of security.

Time to store your motorhome?

- Make sure you choose a safe storage location, with good security and CCTV, and remove any valuable items.
- If keeping it at home, try to use it as many physical barriers as possible – locking gates and driveway security posts are a good idea.
- Invest in wheel clamps, steering wheel locks, alarms and trackers.
